The first child James was born 1843 Dec 17 in London. I'm fairly certain that the best match is a marriage in 1843 (Qtr.1) in Walworth Newington London (in FreeBMD). Have you tried sending for this Marriage certificate for 1843?"

MISCELLANEOUS SHIPPING.

During the voyage of the Cotfield three deaths have occurred. The first was that of a young girl who was very sickly when she came on board, and died of consumption. The next was that of the first mate, Mr. Kerr, who was in the habit of sitting on the rail with his feet over the side, and the ship having given an unexpected lurch while he was in that position he fell overboard, and all efforts to rescue him were unavailing. The cabin boy was subsequently lost, having fallen from the misen.[mizzen] As in the former case, every possible effort was made to rescue him, but without success.

The COTFIELD- Four of the crew have already absconded in the gig belonging to the ship. So noiselessly did they accomplish their design that it is said no one heard them. They have hitherto escaped detection."

*Wendy's note: John HASTWELL was one of her sons and would have been the relative referred to above. Her husband James pre-deceased Mary Ann by five years.

*Wendy's note: The burial site of Mary Ann Hastwell (nee Adshead) is plot no. 258 in the Pink Lake Cemetery, a few kilometres south on the left side of Pt Moorowie Road south of Yorketown, South Australia. It was photographed by Wendy on Wednesday 7 Oct 2009. However, although correctly spelled on the notice board at the gate, the bronze plaque reads "HASTELL Mary Ann 1891 78 years" - the "W" was left out. Notified to Council. New plaque applied and paid for to Family History people in Yorketown.

Interestingly another grave marker no. 302 was discovered nearby for Olive Myrtle Hastwell 6 months.

Information from Yorketown District Council (Oct 2009) indicates that this baby was the firstborn of John Rupert Hastwell, son of John Hastwell, son of James Hastwell and Mary Ann Hastwell; the baby was therefore James' great-grand-daughter.
